COVID-19 guidelines

In Portugal there are no more restrictions for travel, though you may still be required to show vaccination record. There is no longer a general mandatory use of the mask, except in certain spaces (e.g. public transports, taxi, pharmacies, hospitals...). Mask use in certain closed spaces continues to be recommended.

WHAT TO EXPECT FROM THE SUMMER SCHOOL

The Summer School aims to provide co-learning and co-production of knowledge at the intersections of social and ecological issues through a diversity of political-ecological lenses. It builds on the collective experience developed by ECOSOC over the last 10 years with engaged and insurgent research-action on environmental justice and labour environmentalism, the commons, ecofeminism, eco-Marxism, degrowth, alternatives to development, postcolonial/decolonial critique, and emancipatory pedagogies.

Sessions will be co-produced as moments of collective encounters and knowledge co-production. The formats will be mixed. Participants will be in-person, and events will be face-to-face, including discussions in CES spaces and various outdoor locations (forests, river, parks, cultural, community and student centres, city streets. etc.). We will use different co-teaching and co-learning methodologies, including roundtables, field visits, films, board games, collaborative cooking and book-making, performative acts and deliberative group discussions. We also propose keeping a field diary and we invite the self-organization of collective essays, art or other materials reflecting on some of the main learnings emerging from the school.

Even for just 6 days, we want to create a place where everyone feels involved and responsible for taking care of the common space, the energy of the group and the people we share it with.

Here is a tentative list of things that need to be done, and how many people we think are needed for the camp to run smoothly:

- > 6 kitchen helpers: For the self-organized meal (on day 3);
- > 2 per day timekeepers help ensure that activities are punctual;
- > 4 per day notetakers and rapporteurs to help disseminate the knowledge during and after the school

- > 2 per day photographers/illustrators/narrators/artists to document the camp activities;
- > 4 per day simultaneous translators between Portuguese and English.

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(July 12) Day 2 - Navigating the River and Anti-extractivisms

Guided kayak tour through the Mondego River, witnessing struggles for social-environmental justice across Portugal and beyond. Drawing connections between colonial-racist-patriarchal extractivism and the production of sacrifice zones and disposable beings. Visibilizing the visions and practices of enacting eco-social justice, and the connections, collaborations, challenges and ways in which researchers can collaborate. In particular, with this day we aim to:

- Document the problems / critiques from the movements to the dominant system of extractivism and environmental injustices
- Envision the alternatives to this dominant system that emerge and are performed in the movements for environmental/climate justice
- Reflect on the strategies that the movements have adopted, which have worked and which haven't, to advance eco-social justice
- Trace connections between these movements and the climate crisis and demands for climate justice, as well as with feminist, anti-racist, abolition, immigrant rights and other social justice struggles
- Build bridges between these conflicts and other post-extractive conflicts across the globe, from the participants' own territories and embodied experiences
- *Critical analyze* the intersectionalities present or absent within these movements, and how to adopt more intersectional approaches

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(July 13) Day 3 - Care and the City

``[T]here can be no homelessness without an economic, political, and social process that produces 'the home' as a commodity; no refugees without practices of exile from a 'country of origin'; no margin without a center; no periphery without a core`` (Kaika, 2004: 273)

The city is both a physical space and a metaphor for the body politic, the imagined community, the symbolic/material place where the 'political' has been thought to materialize. As such, it can be a very comfortable place for some subjectivities to come to be: yet, it represents a very hostile, deadly, and toxic one for other subalternised subjects which struggle to receive public recognition or – on the contrary – to hide from institutional discipline, control, and violence. The city can be the urban space produced in waves of land dispossession and industrialization: history shows us how numerous bodies (of peasants, migrants, refugees, and other feminized and racialized subjects) have been pushed at the margins of the cities, or at the bottom of the labor chain of production and reproduction.

In this picture, the issue of caring is as complex as the multiple positionalities it involves, according to socio-ecological hierarchies and power relations that differentially structure our lives. In light of the complexity of entanglements between institutional care (as a set of biopolitical dispositifs, including prisons and detention centers), the search of autonomy (self-care) by subalternised subjects, the social reproduction of vulnerable subjects (care for others), and the political project of earth-care, we invited the participants to bridge their reflections and struggles towards connected eco-political projects. These reflections will be grounded in different contexts that cut across centers, peripheries, margins and fringes of Global north and south societies. From Coimbra to Lisbon and Porto, from Italy to Brazil, from Mozambique to Rojava and Romania, the experiences of ten women will be put in a dialogue that connects intersectional systems of oppression, the city, their struggles and forms of care.

We aim to authentically connect to these debates, first by positioning ourselves through our own personal history and experiences. We will ask participants to connect their political life to their own politics, and to emotions: what – in your life, emotions, feelings and life story - moves your ideas and actions? Secondly, by responding to 4 sets of questions:

- 1. What's the City for you? What is Care for you?
- 2. Who cares for the city and who and how does the City Care for? Who can 'access the city' and how?
- 3. Do you Care for the City? If yes, how? How do you relate care, self-care and political ecological projects within the space of the City?
- 4. Among your praxis of Care within the City, which ones do you believe are relevant for bridging and strengthening existing eco-political struggles for the Pluriverse?

Location: Room CA3 of Colégio das Artes (Praça Dom Dinis), University of Coimbra

Methodology: The 3 hours slot (in the morning) is structured in rounds of short talks and Q&A. Invited participants will be asked to respond to these questions in 5-7 minutes, to then leave space for all the attendees to intervene with questions and talks. Another round of interventions will take place, if needed, to allow them to expand from the previous insights.

In the afternoon, we will all be supporting Carmo Perreira in creating a collective cartography of visions for Caring the City.

The commons has become a keyword of different social movements and grassroots initiatives seeking to defend and reproduce various dimensions of life, from land, food and water, to housing, knowledge, and economy. - Practice enacting commoning through role playing, reflecting on the role of games in education and engagement of commoners

- Identify shared visions, challenges, and strategies from these commoning processes in different realms, from forestlands (baldios), integral cooperatives and urban gardens, to migrant communities and refugee camps

Performativity of citizenship usually refers to a particular political and collective power which is not authorized by existing legal regimes while it may be supported by cultural and other discursive conditions. We cannot know in advance what an act of citizenship is: we may however, explore how to enact one, creating a sense of the possible 'yet to come'. We will try to experiment with our imagination, to unlearn our familiar roles, and perhaps liberate some of our 'forbidden-roles', creating sensory experiences towards performing ways of emancipatory social engagements beyond "citizenship", by using, for instance, creative writing, theater, dance and other expressions of the issues which concern us. We will aim at creating a safe, comfortable space and time to work and play together in groups, to express our creativity politically by opening up minds and bodies, and by becoming available to 'perform' unsettled or other ways of being 'citizens'.
