Philosophy of Science and Chinese Sciences: The Multicultural View of Science and Its Unified Ontological Model

The Chinese philosophy of science evolves over the last two thousand years. It differs significantly from that in the West. The issues concerned from the East and West will be reviewed, contrasted and compared.

Recently, some debates and new perspective focused on Chinese sciences in China occurs. Based on this case, by some historical and philosophical reconsideration, a unified ontological model could be suggested to give an explanation for the multicultural view of sciences and its rationality.

Bing Liu obtained his B.Sc. from Peking University (physics department) and M.Sc. from the Graduate School of Chinese Academy of Sciences. Now he is a professor of history of science at Tsinghua University, vice director of the Center for Science Communication and Popularization of CAST and Tsinghua University, and a Guest Professor at some universities in China, such as Shanghai Jiaotong University. Prof. Liu's current research fields include history of physics, historiography of science, philosophy of science, and science. communication. He published 17 books (and translated 7 books, edited more than 30 books), over 130 academic papers, and many notes.
